On Modern Towboats, Technology Rules with Room for Tradition

It is without doubt that advances in technology have influenced the professions and personal lives onboard motor vessels. Satellite TV provides crews with the latest shows to watch during their downtime. Cellphones make it easy to call home or share river information with other towboats. GPS provides accurate location. AIS has replaced VHS radios, allowing vessels to put out their positions and know who is around them. The internet keeps them in touch with favorite websites, email, weather forecasts, news, and sports. Such innovations make the long separations from family and friends more bearable and allows crew members to be more effective at work.

Beyond personal conveniences, perhaps the biggest development has occurred with navigation. Like everything else, navigation has gone electronic, and things are fast, accurate and in realtime – in turn making them easier and safer. At first, many mariners were skeptical, but today they will be the first to tell you how electronic navigation is one of the best tools out there, especially the widely used electronic charting system Rose Point. There's never a time that a captain does not know where he is at or who is around him. It's the major piece of equipment in the wheelhouse that continues to improve every year.

However, some wheelman still find use for paper charts in an age when marine electronics rule. Paper charts, once the only way to navigate, are now relegated to backup status and are required to be kept onboard by the Coast Guard. It is usually the younger mariners who are gung-ho

about technology, but there are some who haven't totally given up on paper charts yet. Many of them have witnessed the transition to digital, but paper charts are still an important part of their onboard navigation routine. Many wheelmen still like to take notes or to jot down quick reminders for future reference. This just goes to show you that there are just some things that technology can't replace or replicate.

Easy Baked Fish

Looking for a simple fish dinner? Try this easy recipe after your next catch.

Ingredients:

- 1 2 lbs of fish
- 1 can of Cream of Shrimp Soup

Directions:

- Cut fish into 2" chucks.
- Marinate fish chunks with Italian Salad Dressing and Tony Chachere's.
- In a baking pan, spread cream of shrimp evenly on bottom of pan, place marinated fish on top and lightly sprinkle Tony Chachere's over the fish. For an extra kick, mix in a few drops of crab boil in the cream of shrimp soup.

Company Policies

In this issue of The Inland Mariner we are highlighting two policies, Personal Hygiene and Safety Shoe Policy.

B.1.130 - Personal Hygiene

Minimum standards for good hygiene:

- A. Shower once a day and after every watch when exposed to cargo vapors.
- B. Hair must be kept neatly trimmed.
- C. No earrings and other visible forms of body piercings are permitted to be worn while onboard. This includes hoops, studs, gauges, plugs, or others that are inserted into the ear, nose, lip, tongue, or cheek.
- D. Shave once a day or as often as needed to ensure respirator fit.
- E. Wash hands before handling food or food preparation items.
- F. Wash hands immediately after cargo handling operations or after handling cleaning and maintenance supplies.
- G. Change bedding on bunk at least once a week.
- H. Wear clean clothing/uniforms that are appropriate for weather conditions.
- I. Clean respirator and personal protective gear as outlined in the care and maintenance of that equipment.
- J. If clothes or skin are exposed to cargo, follow instructions on the SDS or Chemical Data Guide for required action. As a minimum, immediately shower and report incident to supervisor.

B. 1.140 - Safety Shoe Policy

Employees must wear approved safety shoes while on watch or when they leave the inside of the vessel.

- A. Approved safety shoes are to be constructed as follows: leather uppers, steel-toed, chemical resistant with a non-skid sole.
 - 1. Safety shoes will be ANSI approved.
 - 2. Steel-toed tennis shoes and high-heeled cowboy boots do not meet the requirements of this standard.

Safety Point Program

We are happy to announce the launch of our first ever D&S Marine Safety Point Program. Our hope with this program is to be more efficient in


distributing our quarterly safety awards. This new program will be based entirely online through a website store front. Instead of receiving a quarterly award, 20 points will be deposited into your account at the end of each safe quarter you work. Additional ways to earn more points will be announced at a later date. Items available for purchase include apparel, electronics, tools, etc. from name brands like Columbia, Yeti, and Costa. To help with the shipping costs of these items, D&S will make a one-time 10 point deposit at the beginning of each year into your account. Points may be used at any time, however, we encourage you to make purchases within your point balance. If you would like to make a purchase but are short on points, you may pay the difference with a personal credit card. The web address is <u>www.dsmarinerewards.com</u>. Your employee ID will be the last 6 digits of your social security number. Your password has been set to dsmarine, but can be changed once you log into your account.
